

## Tree Sale Details

Thank you for your interest in our tree sale program! Funds from this sale are used to further our conservation work in Clark County. Trees offered in this sale are supplied by Forrest Keeling Nursery, a family-owned and operated nursery in Elsberry, MO. These trees are 3-gallon, Grade 1 (nursery stock) container trees exhibiting straightness of the trunk and uniformity of branching. They are grown using Forrest Keeling's RPM® (Root Production Method), which produces fast-growing, uniform trees. Trees can be easily removed from their containers and directly planted.

## Our Trees

### Arrowwood Viburnum

Clusters of white, flat-topped spring flowers. Its blue-black fruit attracts wildlife. Leaves turn red to orange in fall. H: 6-10' W: 6-10'

### Butternut

Native Butternut, or White Walnut, is a slow-growing tree. Prized for wildlife food. H: 45-75' W: 50-75'

### Buck's Unlimited Oak

Fast-growing Swamp White Oak selection with consistent, heavy yields of acorns. Acorns preferred by wildlife, especially deer. Tolerates wide range of growing sites. H: 100' W: 50-80'

### Buttonbush

Hundreds of ball-shaped, creamy, dangling, white flowers in August. Butterflies and insects find the nectar irresistible. H: 3-6' W: 3-6'

### Eastern Red Cedar

Upright, densely pyramidal evergreen when young; pendulous with age. Aromatic. Birds enjoy its blue, berry-like summer cones. H: 40-50' W: 8-20'

### Eastern Redbud

Native favorite and harbinger of spring that explodes with rosy pink flowers in April. Does well in sun to dappled shade and any average garden soil. H: 20-25' W: 20-25'

### Kentucky Coffeetree

Native, adaptable to a wide variety of sites. Upright crown and heavy branching. H: 60-80' W: 40-50'

### Flowering Dogwood

Native with distinctive white spring flowers on horizontal branches. Clusters of glossy red fall fruit persist into winter and are relished by birds. Consistent deep red fall leaf color. Best grown as understory tree or in area with shade. H: 10-15' W: 8-10'

### Fragrant Sumac

Aromatic Sumac has red berries that follow yellow spring blooms. Brilliant red and orange fall foliage. Leaves and twigs are aromatic. H: 4-5' W: 6-8'

### Fringetree

Shimmering, white fringed flowers cover the tree in May or June followed by small, round fall fruit on female trees. Leaves often turn bright yellow in fall. Grow in part sun to shade as a small tree or shrub. Beautiful as a single specimen or planted in groups. H: 12-20' W: 12-20'

### Hackberry

Reliable, fast-growing, all-purpose shade tree. Pyramidal shape when young matures to broad crown with ascending branches. Leaves are medium green. Fall foliage is soft yellow. Birds and wildlife relish the small, fleshy fall fruit. H:40-60' W:40-60'

### Pin Oak

Strongly pyramidal-shaped tree with pendulous lower branches and glossy, dark-green leaves. Its light brown acorns provide food for many animals. H: 60-70' W:25-40'

## Our Trees continued...

### Pecan

Largest member of the hickory family. Native to the rich, moist soils of bottomlands, especially of the Mississippi Valley. Tall straight trunk with symmetrical, broadly oval crown. The sweet, edible nuts are favored by wildlife and people. H: 70-100' W: 40-75'

### Pitch Loblolly Pine

Pine hybrid that combines the winter hardiness of Pitch Pine and the rapid growth rate of Loblolly Pine. Extensive, fibrous roots allow it to adapt to extreme soil conditions. Excellent for fast screens, conservation plantings, or sites with poor soil. H: 40-60' W: 30-40'

### Red Maple

One of the first trees to color in fall in shades of bright yellow, flaming orange or red. Crown narrow to broadly rounded with straight trunk. Much stronger wood than silver maple but still grows very fast. Often planted as an urban shade tree.. H: 40-70' W: 30-60'

### River Birch

Slow-growing, medium-sized tree with beautiful, exfoliating, reddish-brown to silvery-gray bark. Grow as single trunk or as a multi-stemmed tree. Fall leaf color is yellow. H: 30-40' W: 30-35'

### Yellow Buckeye

The yellow or common buckeye is a deciduous species native to the Ohio Valley and Appalachian Mountains. Grows in mesophytic forest or floodplains. The fruit is poisonous to humans, but can be made edible through a leaching process. H: 60-100' W: 20-40'

### Shagbark Hickory

Highly adaptable, large tree of great character. Name comes from its bark that peels away in sections. Fall color is rich yellow. Produces large, edible hickory nuts. H: 60-80' W: 40-60'

### Smooth Alder

Excellent for stream banks, buffer plantings, and wildlife. Fruit is eaten by several species of birds including the woodcock and ruffed grouse. H: 15-20' W: 5-8'

### Sugar Maple

Easy-to-grow shade tree that grows quickly on a wide range of sites. Deep green foliage with silvery undersides turns gold in autumn, Upright oval shape with strong branching.. H: 50-70' W: 40-60'

### Sweetbay Magnolia

Vigorous upright growth habit. Lemon-scented, creamy white flowers bloom mid-spring through summer. Glossy, semi-evergreen foliage. Cone-like fruits contain bright red seeds enjoyed by birds. H: 30-35' W: 30-35'

### Sweetgum

Deep green, glossy, star-shaped leaves turn a medley of colors in fall ranging from orange to purple to red on a single tree. In fall, forms golf-ball size brown spiked fruits. H: 60-75' W: 40-60'

### White Pine

Large evergreen used alone, in group plantings, windbreaks, or visual screens. H: 50-80' W:30-40'

Please note: Nut-bearing species (such as walnuts and pecans) will normally be smaller (12-14") than other species, which can be 3-6' in height when we receive them.
